Fronting onto Company Road, the Temperance Lodge is located to the south of Gray's Store. The building is of simple rectangular form of a vernacular design. The place is unroofed. Window openings are set high in the walls.

## HISTORY

Completed in late 1861 on land donated by Frederick Waldeck and first used as a school, the place had 34 pupils during its first year of operation. It ceased being a school in 1863 and was subsequently used as a meeting place of the Methodist Temperance organisation of the Good Templars. By 1881 it was known locally as the "Certainly Not" because no alcohol was allowed at the social gatherings which took place there. It was later renamed St Catherine's Hall when used by the Anglican Community between 1891 and 1898. Bob Lawrie lived in the building c1908. The building was eventually bought by Mr McAuliffe and was accidentally burnt out in the early 1940s.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Temperance Lodge ruin has considerable historic significance for its connection to the early development of educational and social activities on the Greenough Flats, in particular for its association with the Wesleyan Community. Despite being a ruin, the place makes an important contribution to the built environment of the Greenough Flats.
